Every town, small or large, has an untold, nearly forgotten history. It is this historic sense of place that informs our public artwork. The idea of capturing the lost stories and alternative histories, of illustrating the tragic and comic events that give a place its personality continues to inspire our work. Many of our projects take the form of relief pieces inset in the ground. Viewers interact differently with inset sculpture; they walk upon and share space on the work - nothing separates viewers from the art or from each other. Our work brings people together to contemplate what makes their community, and themselves, unique.

Pomona College

Pomona, California: For the new Robert A.M. Stern - designed student center at Pomona College, we created a visual history of the architectural landmarks of Southern California. This large scale bronze architectural map is set in the floor of an interior atrium and features a surrounding circular "wreath"


of images from the college's history. The collage provides a complete picture of the school, with images ranging from the Greek goddess for whom the college is named, to the controversial Orasco mural of Prometheus, to more humorous subjects such as the mating habits of the sage hen, the school's mascot.

Exchange Place Station

Jersey City, New Jersey: Set on the station platform of a new light rail system, this abstract bronze map is based on a concept from Jorge Luis Borges' *On Exactitude in Science*: "...In that Empire, the Art of Cartography attained such Perfection that the map of a single Province occupied the entirety of a City...

In time... the Cartographers Guilds struck a Map of the Empire whose size was that of the Empire..." Tiles of our map are set throughout six other station platforms on the line, mapping the exact area that would be encompassed by this central map were it to be extended to other stations at its present scale.







Library Station

Salt Lake City, Utah: Andrews LeFevre Studios was commissioned to create interactive elements for the light rail station for Salt Lake City's new central library. *Chaos Balance* sits in the middle of the central platform, surrounding the sign for Library Station with six tall piles of bronze books. The even, regular piles contain volumes on logic, reason and law; the irregular piles contain titles about chaos, revolution and madness.

On the glass of the waiting areas, we sandblasted a "library" of book spines which contain quotations on literature, poetry, science, philosophy and art. Multiple, contradictory quotations on the same topic were included on different volumes, engaging transit riders in a thought- provoking interaction with text that mirrors the possibilities to be found at the library.



lowa City, lowa: Running along three blocks on both sides of lowa Avenue between the Old State Capitol Building and lowa University is Literary Walk. The Walk features a series of forty-nine bronze pieces set into the sidewalk, intertwined with literary quotes stamped into the adjacent pavement. A civic committee, including members of the lowa Writers Workshop, selected quotations from the works of authors with connections to lowa. Each bronze piece commemorates and reflects the work of a different author, and the entire Walk provides an "everyday celebration" of the state's literary heritage.

Library Way

New York, New York: This series of one hundred pieces, set on both sides of 41st Street from Park Avenue to Fifth Avenue, is designed to lead the viewer up to the main branch of the public library. Each bronze relief panel is based on a quotation about literature, as chosen by librarians throughout the United States. Some pieces are subtle visual extensions of the original texts, others are educational, and some use humor to create comic "reliefs." For example, Francis Bacon's quote: "Some books are to be tasted..." features several gnawed volumes. As a whole, *Library Way* provides a multifaceted reflection of New York's legendary library.



James River Totem


Richmond, Virginia

The Totem is one of three projects commissioned for the James Center, a multi-towered complex in the middle of Richmond. The Center is on the site of the former James River Turning Basin, where canal boats turned to avoid the river's rapids. The lines of the 18-foot bronze totem are based on the contours of the river, connecting local

Universal Man Reproduction

Denver, Colorado: This figure inscribed in a circle is set at the epicenter of a circular atrium, itself at the heart of a larger complex. The navel of the figure marks the exact center of the complex, showing

the centrality of da Vinci to the Western imagination. Our reproduction of the iconic Universal Man was created using terrazzo and cast aluminum with epoxy-filled, incised line work.



Renaissance Figures

New York, New York: Executed in cast fiberglass to look like cast metal, these twelve figures were commissioned for the Renaissance Hotel in Times Square. Each kneeling Atlas figure appears to be holding up the lobby's ceiling, an artistic flourish befitting a grand hotel.

Bronzeville: History of Jazz, Blues and Gospel

Chicago, Illinois: Our Bronzeville map depicts the geographic, cultural and historical features of Chicago's "Black Metropolis." In the period after the First World War, an African-American community of great vitality and influence developed along these streets. The people of Bronzeville produced a new force in Black America: an urban home distinguished for its accomplishments in

business, the arts and community life. This history and heritage are illustrated on our map. Particularly notable in the Bronzeville area was the flowering of great music - jazz, blues and gospel - that has enormously enriched American culture.

Cedar Square Manhole Covers

Boston, Massachusetts: For this project, set in an Olmsted-designed city park, five young artists from the local community were enlisted to help create a series of manhole-cover reliefs. Their works illustrate "insiders' views" of the history of the Roxbury neighborhood.

Labor History

New York, New York: This series of bronze panels, commissioned by the UNITE labor union, details the history of New York City's textile workers. These intricate reliefs chronicle tragic events like the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire, labor victories such as the Great Strike, and depict as well the daily activities of modern workers. The panels work to educate the public about the largely unknown history of this industry, long an integral part of New York City.

Native American History

Many of our inset series and map projects not only reference the present-day character of their sites, but also aim to include formerly prevalent cultures. In many works, Native American craft, imagery and text sit together with more current elements, offering viewers a deeper, more complex sense of the setting and its history.

The piece below is from a series of medallions that celebrate the different ethnic histories of the Seattle region. Set in the circular atrium of the King County Courthouse, Salmon Basket recalls the local Salesh tribe, who were great salmon fishermen. Nestled among realistically rendered salmon is a Salesh design by a local Native American artist, commingling the traditional and the contemporary.

Foley Square


New York, New York: The History of Foley Square medallion series explores the idea of multiple histories coexisting within one physical space. Five bronze medallions are set in a two block long granite paving pattern connecting the different parts of Foley Square, home to Manhattan's many courthouses. Each medallion traces a distinct period in the

history of the Square, from its use as a Native American camp, through its time as a slave burial ground, to its present function as a civic center. Depictions of native species, early maps, and changing architecture help complete viewers' sense of place and of Foley Square's rich history.

Dallas Police Department History

Dallas, Texas: Set in the plaza of the Dallas Police Department's new headquarters, six large-scale arced bronze panels use contemporary and historic imagery to celebrate the history of the city and its police.

Panels include collages of police equipment, news clippings of heroic acts by Dept. members, a history of badges and patches, important architectural sites and even a montage of forms and reports used in daily police work, providing a perspective on the historical and current character of the Department.

Tempe Fire Department History

Tempe, Arizona: Commissioned by Tempe's Arts Commission, this project consists of five strips traversing the entryway to one of Tempe's central park-plazas. Adjoining a new fire station, the five bronze strips explore the Department's history and significance through renderings of historic fires, newspaper descriptions of firemen's exploits, and a historical "lineup" of Tempe's fire engines from horse-drawn carts to the latest equipment.

Boston Bricks


Boston, Massachusetts: Inset in the brick pavement of historic Winthrop Lane in downtown Boston are over one hundred brick-sized bronze reliefs. Each references a different aspect of the history or present-day character of the city. These "bricks" range from a detail of the famous Paul Revere sculpture to a scene of sculling on the Charles River, a collage of popular Boston insignias, the Boston Tea Party humorously portrayed with tea bags, and the infamous Boston driver caricatured as a gorilla behind the wheel.

101 Park Avenue

New York, New York: The Architects' Building at 101 Park served as home to many of the designers of New York's early skyscrapers. Their work is celebrated with our series of twenty bronze panels set into the surrounding sidewalks. Each panel is a detailed portrait of a different building that was designed on this site.


Union Square Timeline

New York, New York: Collaborating with the City of New York Parks and Recreation Department landscape architects, we created a timeline illustrating the rich history of Union Square. The timeline consists of twenty bronze panels inset into a block-long ellipse of bluestone pavers with inscribed dates, set into the paving at the Square's southern end.

The imagery for many of the panels was appropriated from earlier artists who depicted events in the Square, ranging from the Great Meeting during the Civil War, to the passing of Lincoln's funeral cortege, the advent of Ladies' Mile and the first Labor Day parade. The timeline starts in Native American times and runs through the late 1800's and an extension to modern times is planned.
